Holy Trinity Meole Brace



Holy Trinity continues to be a thriving and active place to belong. There are three congregations on a Sunday – 9am, 10.45, 6.30 – as well as many events and activities throughout the week, including a Thursday morning communion service. As the back page of Connect 2 reminds people, "Sundays, midweek activities, old and young alike, there really is something for everyone..."

The 10.45am congregation

Our recent preaching theme in our morning worship has been 'God's amazing family', and it's been great to reflect on that together as a 10.45 congregation. It's been a particular joy to welcome new members — those moving into the area, those encountering God for the first time, and those who have just been born!

Thinking about what it means to be family is perhaps a good way of seeing the 10.45 congregation. Thanks to the Big Sunday Lunch, we are a family who eat together regularly with opportunities to get to know a smaller section of our church family more intimately. Perhaps our biggest challenge remains to be a family that serves one another really well; and we would love to see each member of the 10.45 congregation involved in blessing others in a practical way in the year ahead.

The 6.30 leadership team are a passionate, praying bunch with a heart for God's spirit to move and hear people's stories of faith. Our regular 'Frontline' interviews have continued and this is something we would like to develop in the coming months.



Meole Estate Ministries



Last year we spoke of how the onlookers became admirers and they in turn chose to follow. The followers then learn to become obedient as they choose to imitate a Christ styled life, going full circle as the onlookers in the community see something of Christ in the new followers.

Part of the vision within the Church in the Meet Place is to see His kingdom come in our community. And we have seen growth as the attendance increased over the last year. I believe that this can be attributed to a number of actions; prayer, the intentional discipling of disciples and thirdly encouraging the community to take ownership of all that we are.

Ownership happens at different levels and at different stages. So the onlooker can be the person of peace and befriender well before they are a follower. And all of our guests are encouraged to invite friends and neighbours to join in the process of growing community.

We also partner with a number of outside organisations at the Meet Place we have come to be a hub of information as a by-product of this.

One of these organisations 'The Shrewsbury Food Hub' has also been a major contributor toward our growth. For more information about them see shrewsburyfoodhub.org.uk. The Food Hub has allowed us to talk to the community about loving your neighbours. All are encouraged to take food for themselves (as their need requires) and then to take more for their neighbour. They then may also come to know of the generous heart of God.

Through our ministries we are teaching that it is right to have a deep and personal relationship with God, whilst we are also teaching that it is right to have a deep and honest relationship with each other. This is community becoming family.

How does this look practically? We have for example lovingly redecorated a number of homes and organised carpets to be laid; as well as helped with lifts to appointments for those without transport. Some may say that this is only what you would expect if you live in a Christian community. Yet I see that we live in a time of fear and mistrust, anxiety and stress and so we are demonstrating through Meole Estate Ministries that there is hope, there is trust, there is an unconditional love, freely available to all.

So thank you to all who obediently serve in our community. I pray that you know the peace of God in your life, and His blessing upon blessing.

Café Connect and Trinity Centre





Hospitality remains very much at the heart of who we are and what we do. As you read the reports – or even better come and see for yourself – you'll see people being made welcome, practical needs being served, and God's extravagant grace being lived out.

Café Connect

Café Connect is still a focal point in the community in Radbrook, reaching out with the servant heart of Jesus. We have a lot of regular customers who come back week after week to the Café and I regularly get comments about how they appreciate its existence!

During 2016 we continued to support The Ark, both with money and donated food stuffs. At Easter we collected 131 Easter eggs for the charity Shrewsbury Houses For All, and at Christmas time we collected 64 hampers as well. A big thank you to all who donate to these charities! An ongoing project is the dementia-friendly coffee afternoon once a month, this is run by Ollie Abbott.

Breakfast Club and After School Club take place once a week and are run by Matt Guilder. About 10 youth attend these clubs. During the year we have had about 10 students doing their volunteering for the Duke of



Edinburgh's Award. They do an hour a week for 12 weeks with us. They are a good help in the afternoons as we finish off the day. We also had two foreign students who worked full-time in the café for a few weeks in the summer. They were a good help to us in the holiday season.

The café is run by Dave Aberley and Lissi Small with the help of 40 fantastic volunteers. A BIG Thank You to all the volunteers! Without them we could not operate at all. We would also like to say a big Thank You to Ollie who has been a tremendous help as Dave and I have taken over the management of the Café. We would like to welcome Abby Liew who is working with Trinity Churches for a year and will spend time weekly at the café, helping us out at two busy lunch times.

During the year we introduced new menus, but for 2017 we're looking forward to refurbishing the café completely, after 15 years in service!

The Trinity Centre

It's been another strong year at the Trinity Centre, with a healthy and interesting combination of bookings. I think there is a sense in which we've grown in confidence as a team in understanding and pre-empting 'tricky' bookings - we now have a much more developed position on activities that might conflict with Christian values (naming ceremonies for example) and we also have a stricter policy for teen parties, after one particularly testing experience!

A significant focus this year has been on addressing some of the issues surrounding carparking. William, Helen and Mike Haddaway have been part of a working group looking at this issue and exploring creative ways of resolving problems. There is now the provision for the employment of Parking Attendants when big multiple events are on, and this has been a most welcome development.

Hospitality is at the heart of all we do, and a few small things have made a difference over this past year - we now have some filter coffee machines for smaller bookings, a welcome desk and (you may have noticed?!) air freshener devices in the toilets. We continue to look for opportunities to increase the impact of our welcome and extend our provision. One of our priorities moving forward is to take a fresh look at the reception area - how might our notice boards distinguish us as a Christian place? What

opportunities are there in that space to proclaim the good news of Jesus? What could we do to better orientate people who are there for the first time?

This is my final report as Chairperson of the Trinity Centre Management Committee, and so I'd like to finish by thanking all those who have been part of this group down the years - I'm so grateful for your wisdom and guidance as we live out our faith in service of those who use the Trinity Centre.

Toddler Groups

Our two toddler groups, Trinity Tots at the Trinity Centre, on a Monday afternoon and First Steps at Radbrook Community Centre on a Thursday morning are both thriving places of safe fun, craft and time to chat. Each group has its own particular feel, although both are run in exactly the same way. Through our Christ-like attitude toward those who attend the groups together with craft and stories to reflect the Christian calendar, we hope that some will come to see Jesus as essential in their lives.

Each term we have a theme which for the last term has been 'People Jesus Helped'. Each term we finish by having a small service, applicable to the time of the year.

At First Steps we average 30 children plus their carers each week, we have a good team to "man" our group, but I want to say a big thank you to Doreen and Eric Hedges who are the mainstay for refreshments which they have continued to do despite a few health issues this past year. At Trinity Tots we usually have around 15 children plus their carers each week. This team is also an integral part of the service that we offer to our families each week, enabling them to chat, hold a baby or just to watch over a child.

We try to encourage the families to come to other church initiatives such as Little Buds, our monthly 'Messy' toddler church, and also to the other Messy Churches held at Radbrook and Meole. Our toddler church is a very informal gathering with craft activities, a (very) short service in church and then a cooked lunch. It has been very encouraging to see a growth in the numbers coming to this activity, especially with people coming from the toddler groups who maybe don't usually go to church.

A big thank you to all those who help in any way with the groups, and to Judith Clarkson for all her encouragement.

Trinity Kids

Come into the Trinity Centre on a Sunday morning and you will see our 3 - 11's fully engaged with some amazing leaders. Through discussion, craft, listening, puzzles they are exploring what they believe and why. Some are still questioning what faith is all about, some are ready to go deeper in what they believe and they are guided on their journey wherever they are. Some of Trinity Kids come to We ROC (We Rely On Christ), our weekly small group and again we have a lively, fun time thinking about how we can be true disciples of Christ.

In addition to this last year we did two exciting new things. We took a group on a pilgrimage to the Monastery at the edge of the Stiperstones. We had a lovely time thinking about why pilgrims make journeys and we spent time looking at how we can meet with God through creation. We also had our own Secret Church where we tried to think what it would be like not to be able to worship openly and it gave us chance to think about those who are not as free as we are.

If the children aren't quite ready for Trinity Kids we have a crèche in the Tower Vestry where little ones can go and be shown God's love by the leaders in there and through stories and play. We are so blessed to have so many children – and thanks must go to all leaders who without whom the experiences the children have would be much diluted.

Primary Schools

We continue our links with the primary schools with our weekly Open the Book assemblies, our Schools Experiences each term where we explore key events in the church calendar and being involved in class visits to church taking place in both schools.

Last October saw the third Prayer Space here when each class spent an hour with our amazing team exploring prayer – what it is and how to do it! Another slightly scary thing we have started is a Big/Little Question drop in club once a week — and do they have some questions. Ranging from 'what did God have for breakfast' to 'why did he colour the things the way he did' to 'I pray every night — but how do I hear God speaking to me' we are kept on our toes. But it is such a great forum that allows the children to question, challenge and make up their own minds about what they believe.

Messy Church

This year has seen a few changes in Messy Church. September saw the re-launch of Family Feast at Holy Trinity and Refresh at CTK and now both are known as Messy Church.

Work with young people

We are so so blessed at Trinity Churches to have so many amazing young people but also to be in a parish where there are so many young





people. Over the course of 2016 we continued with our vision of "COMMUNITY - LIFE - CHURCH", and it has been a joy to see growth and development in our work across each of the three distinctive categories.

Our work in the **community** continues to seek to build communities of young people who engage positively in the activities. We've been working in partnership with Shrewsbury Town Council, and in particular on the Thursday evening youth club on the Meole Estate, encouraging the young people who attend to take an active part in their local community. I've also continued work in local schools, as well as in Café Connect.

Our **life** groups are the core of much of what happens midweek, meeting Monday, Tuesday and Thursday evenings as a place where we can come alongside young people and support them in their journey of faith. We seek opportunities to share the good news of Jesus Christ and support them as they learn what it means to be a Christian, and in particular it has been a joy to see some of them get baptised and confirmed over the last year.

Meanwhile our work in **church** means that we can gather young people together on a Sunday morning as part of the Pathfinders and Anon groups; the monthly "B" is also a highlight of the month. In particular we want to encourage the young people to develop a heart which serves other people, and we've had a few opportunities to do just that over 2016. We also got involved in Soul Purpose in May, and Soul Survivor in July, and are looking forward to time away at different conferences over the summer of 2017.

We couldn't do it without our amazing youth team volunteers and all those who give and pray for this ministry. It's my privilege to lead a great team of people who love Jesus and young people, I love that more have come forward to support the ministry



Mens Conference

On Saturday 19th November, about 100 men from churches in Shropshire met at Holy Trinity for the first Men's Breakfast Plus conference. This was a natural development of the occasional Mens' Breakfasts, which in turn originated from a combination of a vague idea that our small group could do something for the wider church and Phil's pointing out that the church (as in UK church not Holy Trinity specifically) engages poorly with men – as shown by a relative scarcity in attendance – and this needed to be addressed.

Small Groups

There are currently 25 small groups across the breadth of Trinity Churches - some grouped geographically, some demographically. In all cases, they are places where worship, word, welcome and witness come together in order that people grow with God and with each other. Although there is often one piece of obligatory study material each year, small group leaders are encouraged to



use whatever materials suit their group - whether it be a traditional bible study guide, a Christian book, trendy(!) YouTube clips or DVDs. Recently, we've 'gone live' on our church website, and this has led to a flurry of enquiries about joining a group. As a new team takes over the oversight of groups in the coming year, we hope that more groups will form and mutual encouragement will deepen as this vital means of belonging continues to flourish.

Restore Course

Windfall and Causeway

As we look to the future, our challenge is to continue to seek ways that we as a whole church can provide the community which Jean Vanier identifies in his book, 'An Ark for the Poor':

While it is true that people with disabilities are called to develop and grow towards greater autonomy, they need above all a whole network of friendships and a community that gives them security and a sense of belonging, awakens each one's gifts, encourages growth, and develops love and a sense of service.

Two specific groups are run currently at church for Adults with a learning disability.

Causeway

This is a group that runs fortnightly for adults with a learning disability. It offers worship, fellowship, teaching, friendship and a whole lot of laughter. Over the last few years it has seen its numbers dwindling, however for many of its members it is their only regular time to worship, and have fellowship so is a really important part of their lives. All who attend are really committed to the group.

The Windfall Project

The Windfall project is a small community interest company that works with adults with learning disabilities to make delicious jams and chutneys. This teaches kitchen skills, work based skills, and builds confidence and self-esteem. We are blessed with 8 wonderful team members who attend, 4 on a Monday and 4 on a Thursday. This year sees us reach the grand old age of five. We are thankful to God for his faithfulness and the church for their continued support and encouragement of the project. We continue to look at ways to grow the project.


Setting a table for the world

God on the frontline

The concept of frontline ministry is rooted in the truth that 'Jesus is Lord'. Jesus lived among those he came to save, and his disciples walked in his footsteps sharing his daily frontline. We are called to live as whole-life disciples today, every part of Christian living belongs to Jesus, and he wants to use each one of us to build his Kingdom here on earth.

'Setting a table for the world' is part of our parish vision, and that means being engaged with God's mission in every area of our lives. Church is where we find family and fellowship in Christ, where we are nurtured and nourished through prayer and scripture, equipped and enabled by the Holy Spirit to go out as disciples into a new week. We all have frontlines, the places where we spend most of our lives: among family and friends, in the workplace, out and about involved in a whole range of activities - wherever God chooses to plant us.

Across the parish we are shaping the concept of whole-life discipleship in several ways, encouraging people to live more fruitfully on their frontlines. During 2016 a group attended 3 excellent frontline seminars led by Neil Hudson from the London Institute for Contemporary Christianity, who also visited church to speak at morning services. 'Transforming Work' is a well-supported course currently running at church, a scripture-based approach to being effective Christians in the workplace.



At Holy Trinity's 6.30 service individuals are regularly interviewed about their lives outside church; where they spend their weekdays, what God is doing there, how we can pray for them. The CTK congregation celebrates whole-life discipleship, sharing their stories and praying for one another as they go about their daily lives as people of God. The Church Army missional living presence on the Meole estate is an integral part of frontline discipleship, touching every area of people's lives. There are regular services at Church in the Meet Place, attended by a faithful group of Christians, as well as activities and fellowship offered to everyone throughout the week.

As a church family let's commit to encouraging and praying for one another on our frontlines during 2017 as we grow in whole-life discipleship.



TMAC

Mission Relief and Development Committee

Generous giving from Trinity church members continues to allow us to support many Christian causes both locally and overseas. In 2016, we continued our practice of giving ten percent of our freewill offerings to God's work further afield, about £28,000 in total.

Our core mission partners remained unchanged through the year, with the Gallaghers in North Africa, the Fletchers in Thailand, Destinations in the Middle East, Neville Willerton in the UK Church Army, and Ben and Gita in Nepal. We recognise that communication isn't always easy, and the importance of developing a relationship that goes far beyond money, and is a two-way commitment to pray and share. It is always good when mission partners can come and visit, and we get to hear at first hand something of what they are doing, and how our support and shared ministry is being worked out.

We also continued to support some other networks and organisations like Shrewsbury Youth for Christ, the Bible Society, Soul Purpose, and Open Doors. Open Doors in particular feels a timely reminder of the persecution of fellow Christians across the world, and we've been glad to use their prayer resources this year at mission lunches, church services, and Trinity Kids.

We would still welcome applications for small grants from individuals in the life of the church, and it is disappointing that there have been no requests made recently. Whatever age or stage of life you are in, if you would like support to go and get involved in God's work further afield then please do ask.

Please continue to pray for our mission partners as we share with them in "setting a table for the world."

With a crisis at hand, we prayed for a replacement chef and were delighted when Clive Szczepanek offered to chef for us. Trinity Table is now growing, with some new volunteer helpers too.

The Tuesday coffee mornings continue, as a weekly opportunity to meet for coffee and a homemade scone, and to bring a neighbour too. We are very grateful to the small team who make scones and serve for us, but new helpers are needed for this important weekly expression of our hospitality.

At Radbrook Community Centre, the Community Teas are continuing to be very popular, with 30 – 50 people coming every month on the first Wednesday. Rita Davies and her willing team of helpers provide a veritable feast of tea, scones and cake which are enjoyed by people from all over the parish, with significant numbers coming from Radbrook House and Radbrook Nursing Home, some brought in wheelchairs by relatives.



PCC, Leadership and Deanery Synod

Decisions about what we do as a church, why we do it and how we do it are made by committees and groups that meet in the background, and they have continued their unseen activity throughout the year to ensure that the church runs well.

Trinity Churches is registered with the Charity Commission, and as a registered charity the PCC members are trustees and therefore have oversight and responsibility for our vision, activities, property, finances and the staff we employ. Members are elected at the Annual Parish Church Meeting and serve for three years on what is effectively the 'governing body' of our church. The PCC met six times this last year to discuss and

develop the church's vision, as well as making decisions on a number of more practical matters. The Standing and Finance Committee, delegated by the PCC to deal with the more detailed and day-to-day work of the church and the PCC met five times this year, and has also delegated responsibility to management committees for the work of the Trinity Centre and the Trinity Money Advice Centre. The latter has recently become a subsidiary of Bridge Debt Advice, and will continue to run as before.

We are entitled to send seven of our PCC members to Deanery Synod, which is the local representative body for Church of England churches. At Deanery Synod local issues that affect all local churches are discussed. Members may also be elected to General Synod, which is the 'parliament' of the Church of England.

Each of our congregations have members appointed by the PCC to leadership teams which oversee the ministry and mission for each of them. These congregational leadership teams comprise Christ the King, Church in the Meet Place, the 9 am, 10.45 am, 6.30 pm and Midweek congregations at Holy Trinity. There is also a Mission Relief and Development Committee which manages our giving as a church to worthy mission causes. The Stewardship Group that has been formed to focus on encouraging our stewardship of the church's resources, both people and financial, has temporarily stopped meeting due to the illness of several members

Money Matters

Looking back over 2016

God is good! I am pleased to report that an overall surplus was generated in 2016 of £12,958. Whilst this time last year we had planned for a deficit of about £12k, we have been able to achieve a surplus position instead.

There are a number of reasons for this, including some one-off factors. In terms of income overall member's giving was 1% higher than the previous year, we secured grants and the Youth partnership with the Town Council, there were more occasional offices than we had budgeted for, and Gift Aid claims were more than we had expected. In addition to this our Charifund Investment which is tied up in the stock market increased in value by c£4k.

When it comes to expenditure Gordon reduced his hours and Peter Hubbard left in the autumn, resulting in cost savings. Children's work expenses were less than budgeted, and we saw savings in some ministry areas and administrative support due to the prudence and care of staff team.

The Trinity Centre and hospitality income for the period was£50k, lower than the previous year, leaving a small operating surplus over the year. Now nine years old, we need to ensure that it continues to be well maintained, and well used.

As of the end of 2016 our reserves stood at £317,888. This includes restricted reserves of £78,341 - money that, by law, can only be used for a specific charity purposes. Restricted reserves held by the PCC include a significant legacy for the education of children in Africa. Reserves that are generally available include those that are designated for specific purposes, such as a sinking fund for repairs and general unrestricted reserves. The PCC aims to keep a minimum of 3 months running costs as working capital, approximately £100,000. At the year-end, unrestricted reserves stood at £176,176. This means that there are funds available which we are able to invest in capital projects that are being discussed at the moment.

We are so grateful to the support of many different people across the parish. Thank you to everyone who gives generously and sacrificially; particularly if you are new or don't yet give regularly please do be in touch with the Church Office for more details, or go to www.trinitychurches.org/give. Thank you also to the team of people involved in finance work, from Gift Aid to counting collections, from office colleagues to my fellow treasurer Brian at CTK.

Looking ahead to 2017

Whilst our income exceeded our expenditure in 2016 we do not expect this to continue, and for 2017 have set a deficit budget. Members' giving – our core income – has only very slightly increased since 2014, and in a year which will see new staff appointments these will have cost implications. We can go forward confident that in the short to medium term any financial shortfalls can be covered by our reserves, although we fully recognise that any commitments to employ staff need to be sustainable in the future.

In setting the budget for 2017 we also recognise that salaries are increasing by 4% to take into account current and ongoing changes to the Living Wage nationally. Our Parish Share contribution to the Diocese also goes up by 1.3% to £107k.

As we seek God's guidance for future plans for the work and mission of the church, we remain committed to being good stewards of all that God has given us.

Looking Ahead

At the APCM in 2016 we outlined six areas for us to develop as a parish, and in many ways these have formed the basis of much of our work and energy at a leadership level: "empowering mission", "equipping people", "making disciples", "reaching generations", "strengthening parish" and "resourcing potential."


Common themes emerge from these, including "frontline discipleship", "growing younger" and the "rhythms of grace". We have sought to develop these priorities through small groups and Sunday sermons, midweek activities and one-to-one conversations. These have also influenced some of our key budget decisions, including significant investment in children and youth ministry, a commitment to supporting mission locally and globally, and recognising the importance of hospitality in Café Connect and the Trinity Centre.

As 2017 continues one of the key issues we currently face is that of **strengthening parish**. How do we affirm and celebrate the diversity across Holy Trinity, Christ the King and Church in the Meet Place, whilst at the same time being one family? We have worked with the concept of "God's amazing family", and current leadership changes in the parish have given us a right opportunity to work more closely together and enjoy the benefits of wider family life.

Secondly is the challenge of **equipping people**, both across the congregations and within the staff team. We're so grateful to many people who serve sacrificially and give so generously of their time, their talents and their money. However we recognise that there is so much more that we might do – within the life of the parish as well as on the frontlines of our lives – if more people were to more fully embrace God's call to whole-life discipleship. We also recognise some significant changes in the life of the staff team these next months, in particular with staff members being called to ordination. This is a joy to see, but also a cause of change, and we pray for guidance and grace as we make decisions and appointments over this next season of the church's life.

Finally we see the priority of **resourcing potential**, recognising some of the physical limitations we currently face in Café Connect, Church in the Meet Place, and Holy Trinity Church. There has been a working group and sub-groups meeting for some months, and we will feed back fully at the 2017 APCM with our response. We are hugely excited for what might lie in store as 2017 continues.
